# Autumn Greetings!

I was visiting some folks last week and we were having a conversation about Jesus and our role as Christians. While we were talking, I was reminded of that slogan popularized in the 1990's - "What Would Jesus Do?" which was abbreviated for bracelets as WWJD. Remember those bracelets and that question?

After a little internet research, I discovered that the specific question was inspired by an 1896 novel by Charles Sheldon titled "In His Steps: What Would Jesus Do?" The original source of this question stretches even farther back to the 1400s in a book by

Thomas a Kempis titled "Imitatio Christi" or "The Imitation of Christ."

It seems that this has been a major question since the beginning of Christendom, with our perspective changing as we experience culture shifts. For instance, I remember in the 1990's when I heard "What Would Jesus Do?" it was always in a response to someone sharing a problem and not knowing how they should proceed. It seemed as though it was a reactive question, though perhaps you had a different experience.

But in the 1400s, the question was posed as part of a spiritual devotional book. How could we form our lives in the example of Christ? How could we imitate Jesus as mere mortals? In that case, it is more of a proactive question - Decide how to be like Jesus, and how to shape your life by his example.

I confess an urging to get back to the 1400s, if only in regard to this question. What would it look like if we walked in the footsteps of Jesus today? What are some things Jesus would do? I have started a list here, and I would love to hear some of your additions, so please let me know!

- Jesus would spend time with people who were not popular
- Jesus would invite people to come and see and listen and learn
- Jesus would talk a lot about money, and how it was of little importance
- Jesus would invite everyone to an impromptu dinner party and feed everyone
- Jesus would point out hypocrisy and occasionally flip over a table to emphasize his point
- Jesus would step away and pray for self-care
- Jesus would focus on children, women, the infirm and the poor and lift them up
- Jesus would love unconditionally

What else would Jesus do? What are some ways we can imitate Jesus today? Call me or email me to share what you think!

# Vicar Carolyn's Sermon on Matthew 20:1-16

You awake long before the sun will begin to rise in the eastern sky.

You bid farewell to your family as you head out to the public square,
gnawing worry in the pit of your stomach. Will you be able to make a living
wage today? Will you find work to buy bread and food for your little ones at
home?

The sun rises as you gather with other day laborers, each weighed down with the same fears of survival. Managers come and take a few workers out into their fields. But surprisingly, there is a landowner searching for workers as well. Usually managers do the hiring work, but this man is picking and choosing his laborers himself. He promises the workers he gathers a denarius. It's not enough to save for tomorrow, just enough money for bread for one day. But what wouldn't you do for that money, for the security that comes with a coin in your pocket!

But you are not chosen. The sun moves high in the sky and its rays beat down on you. You wipe your brow, sweating in the scorching heat. If only you were sweating from work, from an honest day's labor! But instead you remain standing, waiting. Your fear intensifies--how can you go home to your family with nothing?

That strange landowner returns, taking more men with him out into his fields. You're surprised at his reappearance—did he not hire enough workers the first time around? He, too, is sweating from the heat, yet he still chooses to go out again to find workers. He promises these men a just

wage. You assume they'll be paid half a denarius, maybe a little more, but you would take anything at this point.

He keeps coming back, as the sun makes its descent to the west. And finally, finally, he picks you. He doesn't promise you a just wage, he doesn't even make mention of how much he'll pay you, but at this point you really don't care. You need something, anything, to buy your daily bread, to survive. He asks you, "Why are you standing here idle all day?" You respond, with a hint of defensiveness, "Because no one has hired us."

No one has hired us. As the pandemic continues, fear around employment, about getting enough money for your daily bread, remains. While jobs are being re-added to the economy, we still have high unemployment and know all too well that some businesses will never recover from the financial strain of lockdown. I know many friends of mine, and folks in the parish, who are yearning to go out into the fields of their jobs and work. They are willing and able, but why are they unemployed?

In this parable that is full of sheer grace, I have heard many complaints about this passage. "The landowner isn't being fair! If he was fair," the argument goes, "he would pay the first workers more or the last workers less." But just as God challenges Jonah in our first reading, so too are we challenged by Jesus' words here. Who are we to determine God's fairness? God doesn't have to play by our rules. The landowner at first says he will pay a denarius, which is akin to minimum wage, enough money for one day's food. Then he tells the others he will pay them what is just, what is right. And the landowner determines that what is right is making sure that all his workers are paid enough to survive. If we have a problem with

that, then maybe we are the ones who need to re-evaluate what fairness truly is.

God sees the value of every human being, regardless of the work they do. God does not determine your worth from your work. You are valuable simply because you are a child of God.

God's salvation doesn't play by our rules. Regardless of your work, regardless of your long standing commitment to your church, regardless of anything, you receive God's salvation through sheer and abundant grace. That grace is sufficient for the last workers in the fields, and it is sufficient for those who have labored all day long.

This parable stops—it doesn't really have a true ending. There is no resolution between the first laborers and the landowner, nor the relationship between the workers themselves. There is a question in the air that remains unresolved. Will the workers grumble away, or will they recognize the generosity behind the landowner's actions?

Jesus cannot finish the parable because it is up to us to determine its ending. Will we grumble at God's generosity for those whom we think may be undeserving of it? Will we see the value in every child of God, knowing that they too deserve their daily bread? Will we be the managers of God's grace, giving away mercy as we have received it?

The ending is ours to make.

The sun sets, and your work is over. The steward calls you over, his coin purse in hand, and you eagerly draw near. You've only been at work an hour, but it seems like you'll at least get paid something.

And a denarius is placed in your hand! A whole denarius! For you! You didn't earn it, not really, but it's here to save you. You leave the fields, knowing there are some who grumble at your wages. But it doesn't matter what they say.

Your children won't have to go hungry tonight. You can get bread, and maybe even some fish to go along with it. You hold the coin tenderly in your palm. It is a lifeline. It is enough for the day. The landowner gave you what you didn't deserve but desperately need, and that is the end of your story.

That grace, that mercy, is the end of our stories.






