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From Pastor Sam

Blessings!

"You will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth." (Acts 1:8)

These are the last words Jesus says before he ascends to Heaven, 40 days after he is resurrected. The narrative of Jesus rising into Heaven on a cloud in front of the disciples is a dramatic beginning to the Acts of the Apostles. I have to hand it to those disciples - beholding such a sight would likely shock me into a state of *in*action. But the disciples spend only a few moments staring at the departing Jesus, before the "two men in white robes" nudge them out of their paralysis.

The disciples return to Jerusalem, confining themselves to the house for prayer for a brief time whereupon they decide to select Matthias as the replacement Apostle. They are still all together when the Day of Pentecost arrives - when the Holy Spirit blows through the house, enabling the Apostles to speak in different languages and inspiring them to go out and preach and make disciples of all nations.

It seems the Apostles are not meant to sit still, inactive, for very long. They are not meant to stare after their departed leader. They are unable to maintain their "normal lives." *Everything* changes for them, and it continues to change. If they are to go out and make new disciples, they cannot be focusing on their departed leader, thinking about "what used to be."

They must instead focus on the movement of the Holy Spirit, keeping vigilant for opportunities to demonstrate Christ's love and to share the good news of salvation for everyone. Jesus has passed the torch to the Apostles and they must continue running, bringing that flame with them. The work of Jesus is just beginning, and it is up to them to see it through. They cannot look forward if they continue looking up into the sky.

So they *move* when the robed men (angels) stir them to action. They *move* when the Holy Spirit blows through. And they never stop *moving*. While they rest occasionally, they certainly never get comfortably settled again. When

Jesus ascends, the disciples are no longer physically bound to him (though of course they maintain that spiritual connection.) They are free to move when the Spirit says move and they certainly do just that!

We celebrate Ascension Day on May 13th this year and Pentecost Sunday is May 23rd. I invite you to take a close look into yourself what is holding you back, what connections are keeping you from moving forward? How can you free yourself to be open to move where the Spirit moves you?

The Ascension of Jesus, NRSV

Then [Jesus] said to them, "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you—that everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled." Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures, and he said to them, "Thus it is written, that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things. And see, I am sending upon you what my Father promised; so stay here in the city until you have been clothed with power from on high."

Then he led them out as far as Bethany, and, lifting up his hands, he blessed them. While he was blessing them, he withdrew from them and was carried up into heaven. And they worshiped him, and returned to Jerusalem with great joy; and they were continually in the temple blessing God.

Beginning on Jerusalem, A Poem on Ascension by Andrew King

Begin in the brightly painted kitchens.

At the table set for supper

and on the wide couches where we watch TV.

Begin while we are sorting the laundry, writing out the shopping list. And in front of our bathroom mirrors.

Begin in the barns among the warmth of animals and the smells of grain and manure.

Begin in the growing fields, and in the flooded pastures, and where the rains have not come and the soil is cracked and hard.

Begin in the gleaming office towers, the shiny shopping malls, the sweaty factory floors.

Begin on crumbling sidewalks and amid the rumble of subways.

At machines, at our desks, by the coffee makers and computers.

Begin with the rich, the comfortable.

Begin with the poor, the desperate.

Among the successful, the self-assured.

Among the failed and the floundering.

In the glitter of the halls of power, and in the cold and shadowed corners of tragedy and defeat.

Begin on a day when the sun is brilliant; on a day when the sky is gray. In a time when economies are favorable; in a time when all is rust; at the moment when leaders are caring; or amid indifference, hostility, despair. Let us begin beginning again. And whether we have begun and triumphed, or begun and struggled and faltered, we will continue our beginning, as we have from our beginning, at Jerusalem, which is wherever and whoever we are.

Sermon by Pastor Beth 5/9/21

We live in a world of boundaries and they can be helpful. I'm thinking of boundaries between countries, states, etc. But some boundaries are more subtle. They become a part of our identity and help us know who we are in relation to other people, such as, if I see someone wearing a NY Giants jersey, then I can assume they do not like the Dallas Cowboys. Some boundaries are natural such as mountains, rivers, deserts, and oceans. Some are just lines in the sand, literally.

Our reading from Acts highlights many boundaries for first century Christians. To really understand what is going on, I'll give you a short retelling of Peter and Cornelius' story. Cornelius was a gentile, Roman centurion who believed in God and that was a rarity. Peter was one of the apostles who still followed all the Jewish dietary laws and that was pretty common. Cornelius has a vision where he was to send for Peter to come to Cornelius' home. That would be very unusual for a Jew to enter the home of a Gentile, but he sends for Peter. Peter has a vision where he is told to kill and eat animals that Jewish dietary laws prohibit. While he is trying to puzzle out the meaning of this vision, men arrive to take him to see Cornelius and he goes. Peter begins to understand that since God shows no partiality, then Peter should also accept Gentiles. He teaches Cornelius and his household about Jesus which brings us to where we began the reading. The Holy Spirit fell upon the Gentiles. For Peter and Cornelius, boundaries helped them navigate their world. Each of them came from cultures with clearly defined boundaries and expectations. Peter was a Jewish follower of Jesus, who still followed the Jewish law set out in the Torah. Cornelius was a Roman who believed in God, followed the precepts of Judaism, but stopped short of circumcision and full conversion. The practice of those early believers was to keep the boundaries and distinctions in place. If you were a Jew who followed Christ, you hung out with other Jews who followed Christ. If you were a gentile, you hung out with other gentile converts.

Are we that different today? We tend to gather with people with whom we can identify. It's probably one of the reasons why we have so many different Christian denominations! So, when we think of Peter and Cornelius, don't think of this as just history. Think of this as here and now.

Peter is preaching and the Holy Spirit fell upon all who heard the word. Then, catch the prejudice embedded in the text, "the circumcised believers (translation: Jewish Jesus followers) who had come with Peter were astounded that the gift of the Holy Spirit had been poured out even on the Gentiles."

How often do we do that? Invite people to join us, but then assume that we are still the only ones with the gifts? We don't accept what gifts new people bring because we want things to stay the same.

Those early disciples believed in what Jesus commanded them when he said to take his gospel to the whole world so they had been preaching to the Gentiles as well. But they seemed to operate as if those new converts had to act exactly like them to receive the gifts of the Spirit. Back at the turn of the 20th century there was a church in Tucson, Arizona that sent money to the many Native American reservations in Arizona. The gospel told them to take care of the poor, so they did. They sent money, clothing, and food support. But then people started leaving the Reservations and came to the cities, including Tucson. Where did they go? They went to the church that had so faithfully supported them.

But the white congregation in Tucson wasn't quite ready for integration. Sending money and support to the Reservation was one thing. Having those people show up to worship was something else entirely. So, the Tucson congregation started a new congregation so the Native Americans would have their own place to worship. While that story makes me sad on many levels, it is not all bad news. The Holy Spirit was not to be deterred. This new congregation became Southside Presbyterian Church. It is a beacon for social justice, a place where all are welcomed, an active leader in their community, and a reminder that God's ways are not in our control. Nor will God's ways be held back by our boundaries and walls.

We can see the breaking down of Peter's boundaries in this reading. At the beginning, he has a clear understanding of what is clean and unclean. But Peter moves to see that if the Holy Spirit has visited the Gentiles, there is nothing to separate them anymore. Cornelius's assumptions are changed too. There was no reason that a Roman Centurion, no matter how faithful a man, would feel a need to invite Peter into his home. Yet the angel told him to do it, so he does.

The Spirit challenges our assumptions, keeps putting us in situations where we are not comfortable. Imagine having someone come to your house who is from a foreign country. You don't know their food preferences. You don't know their cultural traditions or expectations. You want to be a good host but are aware that you will likely get something wrong. There was a young man from Colombia who was in our high school as an exchange student. The adjustments were many for both, this young man from Colombia and our community. It was both a great experience and an exhausting one, for all of us. Our food preferences were different. Our life experiences were different. For example, he didn't understand, no matter how much we tried to explain it to him, why we would get in the car and drive to a restaurant when there was plenty of food at home.

He also didn't understand why someone would keep goats as pets. He offered to show the owners how to butcher and cook the goat, who politely declined the offer of turning Billy the goat into stew.

Peter and Cornelius, at the urging of the Holy Spirit, come together, tearing down boundaries and trusting God who brought them together. They were each given visions that allowed them to see the world differently, to see their relationship with each other differently, and to see their boundaries differently. But it wasn't easy for them. Peter winds up in all sorts of trouble in the next chapter. Not for baptizing Cornelius and his friends, but for eating dinner with them.

Listening to the voice of the Spirit is not without risks. It will certainly put you in uncomfortable situations. It will cause you to reconsider. It might even get you in trouble. But it will also help you break down the boundaries that either you have built for yourself or your society has built for you.

The question for you is this: where is the Holy Spirit calling you to break down your boundaries? Who is out there in the community, or in this parish, that might be waiting for an invitation from you before they can cross their own borders and live into what God is dreaming for them?

The question for us, as a congregation, is how do we listen for the voice of the Holy Spirit and live into the future God is dreaming for us? Because if we listen to the voice of the Spirit, we need to be ready to be disrupted. We need to be ready to not control the

outcome. We need to be ready for things to happen in ways we do not expect or even want.

When boundaries seem too hard to overcome, when the walls that divide seem to be too great for us to break down, take heart that God's Spirit will not be limited by them as we are. God's Spirit will help us overcome. Some things, like the Holy Spirit, flaunt borders. Lizards can scale a wall without a thought. Butterflies float right over the top, riding on the wind. These walls that seem so insurmountable to us are not insurmountable to the Holy Spirit.

In the final verses, the narrator makes an interesting comment. "Then they invited Peter to stay for several more days." The Spirit brings people together for relationship. The choice is ours. Accept them and the gifts and the problems they bring into our midst or force the Holy Spirit to leave you behind and find another way. The choice is ours.






