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From Vicar Care

[Jesus] woke up and rebuked the wind, and said to the sea, "Peace! Be still!" Then the wind ceased, and there was a dead calm. --Mark 4:39

There is a term in literary criticism called 'pathetic fallacy'. It's a literary device used by authors to relate their characters' emotions to the weather. For example, the hot muggy weather during the play *Cat on a Hot Tin Roof* signifies the simmering tension broiling between the family members.

Here, I wonder if the author of Mark is using this 'pathetic fallacy' as he wrote his Gospel. Is he recalling a historical fact, this miracle, or is he remembering a time when Jesus stilled his anxious heart? Did Jesus calm the waves of Galilee, or calm the spirits of his disciples on the boat?

I think it is both--both an outward and inward miracle. When the storms are crashing against the boat, the disciples ask Jesus, "Teacher, do you not care that we are perishing?"

And the response: "Peace! Be Still!" Jesus stilled the storms frightening the disciples outside and he stilled the anxiety within their hearts. Jesus cares that we are perishing; indeed, his whole mission is to bring life in the midst of death.

Yet the disciples doubted, and sometimes we do too. At times I find it hard to believe that the Almighty God, the One who formed the heavens and the earth, would care about the life of one of billions and billions of humans who have existed on this earth.

The great mystic Julian of Norwich had a vision: "[God] showed me a little thing, the size of a hazelnut, lying in the palm of my hand, as it seemed. And it was as round as any ball. I looked upon it with the eye of my understanding, and thought, 'What may this be?'

And it was answered generally thus, 'It is all that is made.' I marveled how it might last, for I thought it might suddenly have fallen to nothing for littleness. And I was answered in my

understanding: 'It lasts and ever shall, for God loves it. And so have all things their beginning by the love of God.'

In this little thing I saw three properties. The first is that God made it. The second that God loves it. And the third, that God keeps it."

God has made you. God loves you. And God will keep you forever.

When the storms of your heart are raging and doubts threaten to consume you, I pray that you may feel Christ's miraculous peace, the peace that can calm any water or wind.

A Prayer of Confession by Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

Thou Eternal God, out of whose absolute power and infinite intelligence the whole universe has come into being,

we humbly confess that we have not loved thee with our hearts, souls and minds, and we have not loved our neighbors as Christ loved us.

We have all too often lived by our own selfish impulses rather than by the life of sacrificial love as revealed by Christ.

We often give in order to receive. We love our friends and hate our enemies.

We go the first mile but dare not travel the second.

We forgive but dare not forget.

And so as we look within ourselves, we are confronted with the appalling fact that the history of our lives is the history of an eternal revolt against you.

But thou, O God, have mercy upon us. Forgive us for what we could have been but failed to be.

Give us the intelligence to know your will. Give us the courage to do your will. Give us the devotion to love your will.

In the name and spirit of Jesus, we pray. Amen.

From the Sayings of the Desert Fathers and Mothers (Abbas and Ammas)

In the beginnings of Christianity, there were some devout believers who took very seriously the call to sell all possessions and give money to the poor (Matthew 19:21). These Christians formed communities in the desert--a prelude to modern monasticism--to pray and worship and work and teach others the Way of Christ. Sayings from these men and women have been preserved and offer great wisdom for us today. We celebrated the lives of Anthony and Pachomius, two of the most revered Desert Abbas, on Sunday January 17.

Abba John the Dwarf said, 'A house is not built by beginning at the top and working down. You must begin with the foundations in order to reach the top.'

They said to him, 'What does this saying mean?'

He said, 'The foundation is our neighbor, whom we must win, and that is the place to begin. For all the commandments of Christ depend on this one.'

One day some old men came to see Abba Anthony. In the midst of them was Abba Joseph. Wanting to test them, Abba Anthony suggested a text from the Scriptures, and, beginning with the youngest, he asked them what it meant. Each gave his opinion as he was able. But to each one the old man said, 'You have not understood it.'

Last of all he said to Abba Joseph, 'How would you explain this saying?' and he replied, 'I do not know.' Then Abba Anthony said, 'Indeed, Abba Joseph has found the way, for he has said: "I do not know."'

Amma Sarah said, 'If I prayed God that all men should approve of my conduct, I should find myself a penitent at the door of each one, but I shall rather pray that my heart may be pure towards all.'

Amma Syncletica said, 'Just as a treasure that is exposed loses its value, so a virtue which is known vanishes; just as wax melts when it is near fire, so the soul is destroyed by praise and loses all the results of its labor.'

Oh, what joy for those
whose disobedience is forgiven,
whose sin is put out of sight!

Yes, what joy for those whose record the Lord has cleared of quilt,

whose lives are lived in complete honesty!

When I refused to confess my sin, my body wasted away, and I groaned all day long.

My strength evaporated like water in the summer heat.

Finally, I confessed all my sins to you and stopped trying to hide my guilt.

I said to myself, "I will confess my rebellion to the Lord."

And you forgave me! All my guilt is gone.

For you are my hiding place;

you protect me from trouble.

You surround me with songs of victory.

that needs a bit and bridle to keep it under control."

A Prayer by Saint Francis

Most High, glorious God, enlighten the darkness of my heart, and give me right faith, certain hope, and perfect charity, wisdom and understanding, Lord, that I may carry out your holy and true command. Amen.

Sermon for the 2nd Sunday after Epiphany by Pastor Beth

Bruce Larson tells this story in his book, "Faith for the Journey". Once there was a successful factory that made drills. At a board meeting the owner asked his four vice presidents, "What are your goals for the company for the next five to ten years"?

One vice president replied, "Well sir, we are looking at new sizes and shapes for different drills". The owner then said, "I have news for you - there is no market for drills". Talk about tension in the air. He continued, "From now on we will not think drills. We will not sell drills. We will sell holes! People don't want to buy a drill; they want to make a hole!"

As they began to think of other ways to create holes they developed other methods for hole drilling like lasers. They were able to move from thinking about drills to a whole new world of possibilities.

In the gospel reading people are moved from thinking of Jesus as the son of a carpenter from Nazareth to something much more. They had an Epiphany moment where they moved from one way of thinking to another. They moved from a narrow view to a broader, more abstract view. John the Baptist came to call Jesus "Lamb of God" - the one who would become a sacrifice for all people, one to be cherished. Another disciple called Jesus Rabbi or teacher - someone who taught God's law, one to be respected and listened to. Another called Jesus Messiah, the anointed one, the One picked by God. Philip said Jesus was the one Moses and the prophets spoke about, that Jesus was the fulfillment of scripture. And Nathanael came to see Jesus as the King of Israel, the ruler of the nation, their leader, conqueror and protector.

And every bit of that is true. Jesus is all those things. He is the Son of Man, the link between God and humanity. All of these descriptions speak about who Jesus is to us.

What did the disciples do with their moments of recognition, their Epiphany moments? They all issued the invitation for others to see Jesus as more than just a man from Nazareth.

I know many of you will remember the Mercedes commercial from several years back that showed a Mercedes crashing into a concrete wall during a safety test. An engineer in a white lab coat walks over after the crash and kneels down to examine the damage, which is minimal. A reporter then asks the engineer about Mercedes' energy absorbing car body. After the engineer tells all about the unique design the reporter asks him why Mercedes doesn't enforce their patent on the design, as it was being copied by several other companies. The engineer replied, "Because some things in life are too important not to share." How true is this.

There are many things in life that fall into this "too important not to share" category. Advances in science, in medicine like vaccines, in technology. But as important as all those are, they pale in comparison to the importance of sharing our faith.

We are often reluctant to share our faith. Maybe it is a good thing that we are on Zoom this morning and I won't be able to see your responses, but how many of you have shared your faith with anyone in the past week or month or year. Truth be told, we Lutherans are really bad at this. So bad that many of our children have never heard from their parents how it is they came to believe or how their faith impacts their lives. If we can't tell our own children, how are we ever going to tell others?

Maybe we think we all need to be theological scholars to talk about faith, but Philip certainly was not. He had just learned about Jesus so he wasn't an expert. He simply said, "Come and see". He started out by saying why he was inviting Nathanael and then "come and see".

Nathan Williams told of two men who had been business partners for over 20 years. They met one Sunday morning as they were leaving a restaurant. One of them asked, "Where are you going this morning"? The second man said he was off to play golf and invited his partner to join him. The first man said he was heading to church. The second man replied, "We have been partners for 20 years. We have worked together, attended board meetings, and had lunch together. In all of these years you have never asked me about going to church. You have never invited me to go with you. Obviously, it doesn't mean that much to you. Let's go play golf".

We invite people into all aspects of our lives. Come see my new house, meet my life partner, and don't even get me started on what we share on social media. Why is inviting someone to meet the one who sets us free from sin so hard? It doesn't take much, just an invitation to come and see. And these days all we need to do is send a zoom link, or your parish connection packet with the sermon from last week in it! Couldn't get much easier.

Those who do join us may have their own epiphany moment. They may see
Jesus as more than a man in history. They may recognize Jesus as the One who




