Transfiguration Sunday

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From Vicar Care

Grace and peace to you all in the Name of our Lord Jesus Christ!

I cannot believe that Lent is just around the corner. February 17 is the beginning of this season of repentance, solemnity, fasting, and almsgiving. Just as Jesus fasted for 40 days in the wilderness, so too do we have this time to turn from our sins and live for God alone.

Fittingly, Confirmation Class this week focused on the temptation of Jesus. Pastor Sam showed a video depicting this biblical story. Just as the Gospel of Luke says: "Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit in the wilderness..." In the video, an animated Jesus happily receives the Holy Spirit as a (very plump!) dove. Then that same dove guides him out to the desert. It made me laugh; I have never pictured Jesus literally following a bird out into the wilderness!

Though I am sure Jesus was not physically guided by a dove to the desert, it is true that he was led in some way by the Holy Spirit to his temptations. It's surprising to think about--after all, we pray in the Lord's Prayer to "lead us *not* into temptation." But isn't that exactly what the Holy Spirit did?

When we are our best selves, I don't think any of us wants to be led into temptation, into a situation where we must resist something that entices us away from love of God and care for neighbor. Yet so often we barely need to leave our house to be tempted! As one ancient Christian woman Mother Matrona put it, "we carry ourselves wherever we go, and cannot escape temptation by mere flight."

As we draw nearer to Lent and consider what spiritual practices we will undertake during this holy season, perhaps we can embrace temptation. Perhaps the Holy Spirit is calling us out into the wilderness to be tempted, to learn what we are addicted to and what we can live without, to be guided into loving our neighbors more fully, to discover hard truths about ourselves. It is no easy task to face temptation. Jesus knew that all too well after 40 days in the desert. We know that as sinful and redeemed children of God. So perhaps your prayer this Lent can be taken from Mother Sarah:

"Do not pray to have no challenges but pray rather for the strength to endure it all."

I pray you have the strength to endure whatever temptations come your way this week and this Lent. I pray that you find strength in unexpected and holy ways. And I pray that through all our temptations, we may catch a glimpse of the Holy Spirit guiding us through them all.

Understanding Facebook Groups and Pages

Tri-County Lutheran Parish has both a Facebook group and a Facebook page. Ever wondered why and what the difference is?

First, our group is a closed group. This means that you must be an approved member of the group to see what is in the group. The closed status lets us post things that are not meant for widespread viewing such as prayer concerns, diagnoses and other personal things. We also cannot share what is posted on the group allowing for more privacy.

The page is public. This means anyone can see what is there and members can share what is posted on the page. Please be sure that you do not put personal information on the page.

Why have both? Because we want to have a place where the whole parish is able to share information in a private manner (group) and a place where we can access shareable information (page). An example of what is on the group is when we posted gratitude prompts in November. Members shared some personal information with one another. An example of what is on the page is our worship events. We want you to share these! When you share the worship event, a copy of the event is placed on your page so your friends can see it. The easiest evangelism there is!

It is important that you do "like" all posts. We want the public to see our page. The more "likes" we have, the more prominent it is in the Facebook searches. Please take a second and click the like button to help the parish grow a social media presence. Share the worship events and other posts from the page so others may worship with us.

"We Never Expected the Transfiguration" by Loretta Pehanich

This story is inspired by Luke 9:28–36, the Transfiguration of Jesus. Jesus casually invited three of us on a hike one warm, sunny day. I think Peter, James, and I are probably his closest buddies. Can you imagine what it felt like to be Jesus' best friend? The hike turned out to be a steep one, but we were happy to go along. Wherever Jesus was headed, we were willing to follow. But we never expected the Transfiguration. When I got up that morning, I never expected to be seeing Moses that afternoon. I was stunned.

What did it feel like to see Elijah talking to Jesus about Jesus' exodus? Exodus? Why did he use that word? It would take me a long time to process that unexpected encounter.

And Jesus didn't want us chattering about this experience, so Peter, James, and I would whisper about it occasionally.

"Remember his clothes? They were so white it was blinding."

"What did it mean that God spoke from a cloud?"

"Did you feel the ground shake, or did I imagine that?"

"I wonder what they were talking about. I couldn't make out the words."

"I think there was some connection between that mountain and Mount Horeb."

After the Resurrection, we would tell the story of the Transfiguration again and again. And I am sure that others benefit from this retelling. That's how it is when you have an unexpected encounter with God; it must be remembered and shared for the benefit of others.

Sermon by Pastor Beth

Have you ever really been on a roll? Like everything just keeps falling into place and you get so much accomplished, you don't want to stop. I think it is true that success breeds success. That feeling one gets when something is finished well leads to beginning another project.

As I read the opening of the gospel of Mark for a bit of context into our text for today, it was like Simon, Andrew, James and John were on a roll. They had been called by Jesus to be fishers for people. They followed Jesus from the seashore into the town of Capernaum and listened as Jesus taught them and everyone else around at the synagogue. They were amazed at how and what he taught them. This was someone who has real authority. This is someone quite different from the scribes they were used to. This is a man worth following.

And then the real eye opener happens. Jesus rebukes an unclean spirit to leave the body of a man. The spirit is forced to leave the man and everyone is beyond amazed. This man can command the spirits and they obey. Can you just imagine the word spreading about that one? News about Jesus, his healing of the man, his teaching, his authority, it all spreads faster than wildfire through the town.

What happens next? This is where our gospel reading picks up the story. They go home for lunch. Sort of anti-climactic isn't it? Not what I was expecting. I would be like, if this man can command a spirit to leave and it responds, then he can certainly heal my bum knees, your arthritis, your diabetes, your cancer. I would have been dragging people to meet this guy and be healed! But, they go home for lunch.

Things are not as they expect though. Simon's mother-in-law is sick with a fever. As the senior female in the house, she is the expected host. She would oversee the cooking, serving of guests, and everything home related. She is not able to do her duty and this is a matter of family honor for the hostess to

serve important guests. So, Jesus heals her. She gets up from her sick bed and begins to serve her guests.

Now before you think that those men should have just served themselves and let her rest, I can only say to stop thinking in 21st century terms. What Jesus did for Simon's mother-in-law and the man possessed by the spirit was to return them to their community. She was able to resume her position in her society as the head of the house. She was able to serve with dignity. The possessed man was able to return to life as a contributing member of his community. He could work again and have dinner with the family without fear. This is an amazing gift that Jesus gave them. When you are stuck in the hospital or rehab facility, what is the overall objective I hear the most often? I just want to go home. We want to return to our lives. We want to return to what is familiar and comfortable for us. Jesus' healing did that and more for these folks.

How did the community respond? People started showing up bringing their sick and possessed family with them in the hopes that this man would heal them. The text says the whole city was gathered around the door. Jesus cured many and the next day they left for another town.

So here is my big question when I read this. Why didn't Jesus heal everyone? What is the point of his healing people if he doesn't do it for everyone? I suppose we have to look at the big picture and not focus on individual lives because the point of the healings is not about the person being healed. It is about Jesus. It is all about Jesus the Messiah. Jesus the Messiah who came to earth to proclaim the message of God. The goal is to proclaim the message of God. Healing people was a way to get the attention of the crowds! Healing people helped get the people ready to hear what Jesus was proclaiming.

What was he proclaiming? The kingdom of God has come near, repent, and believe in the good news. The kingdom of God has come near. It was standing right there before them! The good news, in bodily form, was proclaiming its own existence. God is not some far away, disinterested being that has no compassion for your suffering. God loves you. God loves you so much that the Son of God was willing to die on a cross for you to bring you healing like you've

never dreamed possible. Maybe not physical healing of an illness but healing of your soul.

The demon possessed man and Simon's mother-in-law and all the others healed that day had no idea what those miracles were pointing to. They knew they received a miraculous gift at the hands of Jesus and in that gift, the hearts of many were opened to understand their relationship with God in a whole new way. It would take a few years to bring all this about, but the kingdom of God was now a reality in the lives of believers.

Maybe Simon was absolutely right to take Jesus home for lunch. There in the house where they would break bread together in the ordinary meal, they would begin to be shaped into disciples. We gather to break bread together, sharing in the supper Jesus gives us. An ordinary meal of bread and wine, made extraordinary because of the life, death, and resurrection of the One who loves us more than life itself. And through that meal we are shaped into disciples.



¹Now when the LORD was about to take Elijah up to heaven by a whirlwind, Elijah and Elisha were on their way from Gilgal. ²Elijah said to Elisha, "Stay here; for the LORD has sent me as far as Bethel." But Elisha said, "As the LORD lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So they went down to Bethel. ³The company of prophets who were in Bethel came out to Elisha, and said to him, "Do you know that today the LORD will take your master away from you?" And he said, "Yes, I know; keep silent."

⁴Elijah said to him, "Elisha, stay here; for the LORD has sent me to Jericho." But he said, "As the LORD lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So they came to Jericho. ⁵The company of prophets who were at Jericho drew near to Elisha, and said to him, "Do you know that today the LORD will take your master away from you?" And he answered, "Yes, I know; be silent."

⁶Then Elijah said to him, "Stay here; for the LORD has sent me to the Jordan." But he said, "As the LORD lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So the two of them went on. ⁷Fifty men of the company of prophets also went, and stood at some distance from them, as they both were standing by the Jordan. ⁸Then Elijah took his mantle and rolled it up, and struck the water; the water was parted to the one side and to the other, until the two of them crossed on dry ground.

⁹When they had crossed, Elijah said to Elisha, "Tell me what I may do for you, before I am taken from you." Elisha said, "Please let me inherit a double share of your spirit." ¹⁰He responded, "You have asked a hard thing; yet, if you see me as I am being taken from you, it will be granted you; if not, it will not." ¹¹As they continued walking and talking, a chariot of fire and horses of fire separated the two of them, and Elijah ascended in a whirlwind into heaven. ¹²Elisha kept watching and crying out, "Father, father! The chariots of Israel and its horsemen!" But when he could no longer see him, he grasped his own clothes and tore them in two pieces.




