Fourth Sunday in Lent

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From Pastor Sam

Greetings,

As Spring rapidly approaches and the season of Winter winds down, I become excited. As much as I love the still beauty of falling snow and the cold quiet of Winter, I do look forward to the promise of Spring: clearing out the flowerbeds, planting seeds and waiting for everything to grow.

One of my favorite poets, Wendell Berry, writes of this time in his poem titled, "A Purification":

At the start of spring I open a trench in the ground. I put into it the winter's accumulation of paper, pages I do not want to read again, useless words, fragments, errors. And I put into it the contents of the outhouse: light of the sun, growth of the ground, finished with one of their journeys. To the sky, to the wind, then, and to the faithful trees, I confess my sins: that I have not been happy enough, considering my good luck; have listened to too much noise; have been inattentive to wonders; have lusted after praise. And then upon the gathered refuse of mind and body, I close the trench, folding shut again the dark, the deathless earth. Beneath that seal the old escapes into the new.

In addition to the blatant imagery of seasonal changes, we can read this poem with a Christian lens as we more deeply consider the time of Lent. As we look inward to consider those things of which we need to repent, those things that come between us and God. During Lent, we discover and pluck those things from our hearts and, much like Berry writes of putting these things in a trench, we prepare to leave them at the cross of Jesus Christ.

When we clear out the flower beds of our hearts to remove the dead plants (guilt) and weeds (sins), we make space for God to "create a clean heart, and renew a right spirit within us," (Psalm 51:10 paraphrased) where love can grow and where fresh opportunities to serve others can blossom. The old has passed and must be removed so that the new seeds can have a chance at optimal growth.

As we continue through Lent, I invite you to a time of clearing out your hearts. Spend some time examining. Identify habits and thoughts that are uncharitable or unkind. Find those old uncomfortable feelings of guilt lodged in the corners. Invite the Holy Spirit to come and help you clean up! Take some breaks to pray or read some scripture. Once you have identified all those things that are getting in the way of your relationship with God, get rid of them. Fill your hearts with forgiveness and grace and hope and love - to make it ready for all God has intended to plant.

Understanding Facebook Groups and Pages

Tri-County Lutheran Parish has both a Facebook group and a Facebook page. Ever wondered why and what the difference is?

First, our group is a closed group. This means that you must be an approved member of the group to see what is in the group. The closed status lets us post things that are not meant for widespread viewing such as prayer concerns, diagnoses and other personal things. We also cannot share what is posted on the group allowing for more privacy.

The page is public. This means anyone can see what is there and members can share what is posted on the page. Please be sure that you do not put personal information on the page.

Why have both? Because we want to have a place where the whole parish is able to share information in a private manner (group) and a place where we can access shareable information (page). An example of what is on the group is when we posted gratitude prompts in November. Members shared some personal information with one another. An example of what is on the page is our worship events. We want you to share these! When you share the worship event, a copy of the event is placed on your page so your friends can see it. The easiest evangelism there is!

It is important that you do "like" all posts. We want the public to see our page. The more "likes" we have, the more prominent it is in the Facebook searches. Please take a second and click the like button to help the parish grow a social media presence. Share the worship events and other posts from the page so others may worship with us.

Sermon for Lent 3 by Rev. Samantha Perret - based on John 2:13-22

When I work with couples seeking premarital counseling, one of the things I point out, other than the power of forgiveness, is how important it is to have reasonable expectations (of your partner, of yourself and of the relationship). When our unreasonable expectations are not met, that often leads to disappointment and conflict. So, when we can discern reasonable expectations, and communicate those to our partners, we are more likely to meet those expectations and thus avoid that conflict.

In our Gospel lesson, we can see what happens when expectations are not met - and the conflict that can result. Jesus has entered the temple in Jerusalem at the time of Passover [Now, it is important to note, that this is not THE Passover immediately preceding his death, but rather the first Passover in his 3-year ministry that is accounted in the Gospel of John. Jesus has come from the wedding in Cana, where he changed water into wine, and after a brief couple of days in Capernaum, enters Jerusalem.] He is at the very beginning of his ministry. Jesus has certain expectations surrounding his visit to the temple. He expects it to be a place where everyone can worship God. Where he will hear scriptures read and those listening would be educated. Instead, he finds money changers (exchanging the Greek and Roman money into Jewish shekels) and vendors selling overpriced animals used for offerings. This system would not have been a surprise to Jesus, but it wasn't what one should expect from a place of worship, from a house of God.

Jesus is deeply disturbed by the presence of the money changers and the vendors of sacrificial animals. He is angry that these people are making a profit off the sacred nature of sacrifice. He is angry that worshipers are being exploited - paying unfair and steep prices for what they feel they need to purchase in order to be in a good relationship with God.

As a result, Jesus reacts in a violent way, brandishing a whip, flipping tables and driving the animals out. Notice, Jesus doesn't drive the people out - he simply eliminates their means to exploiting those in need of those services. The people are given a second chance. Jesus expects something different.

As a result, we see a Jesus in this Gospel account who is very different from the one whom we expect. We expect our Jesus to be loving, calm, and, well, NICE. This Jesus is angry, passionate, and not nice, but shall we say, full of righteous indignation. This Jesus makes us feel awkward and uncomfortable. Our image of Jesus is altered.

But this is only because we have unrealistic expectations regarding Jesus. While this image of Jesus isn't calm or NICE - Jesus is justifiably upset and seeking to make the situation *right*. Allowing the poor to be overcharged and exploited is not something that should have been allowed in the Temple, of all places. Jesus being NICE isn't going to change this dirty system.

From that time on, there is no question throughout the Gospel accounts as to how Jesus feels about the importance of doing the right thing. At the end of the day, this is the most reasonable expectation we can have about Jesus - not that Jesus is NICE, but that Jesus will always do the right thing. If we expect that - we will never feel uncomfortable when Jesus is true to his nature. We can read this passage with complete understanding as to the motives of Jesus and can truly appreciate his passionate response.

There is a lot we can learn about not only the example of Jesus, and our emotional responses to his actions, but also how we can set reasonable expectations as we work together as followers of Jesus today. This Lenten season is a good time to think about some of these questions - not just because we are in a time of natural introspection, but also because our parish is actively engaged in an Outreach campaign.

How do you expect the church to answer the call to serve and love our siblings in Christ?

Have you ever expected people to just show up and attend worship?

Do you expect all the members of a congregation to work together to reach out to the "least of these"?

What expectations do you have for your own level of commitment?

What do you expect new Christians might need from us on their faith journey?

What reasonable expectations can we place on ourselves and others as disciples of Jesus Christ?

I hope it is a reasonable expectation to always strive to do what is right even if that puts us at odds with our neighbors. I hope that by our actions, we can change how others expect us to behave. I hope we can be expected to speak up for those who have been silenced, to feed those who are hungry, to comfort those who are in need of care.

We can also expect that occasionally, we might not meet even those reasonable expectations. Sometimes those with whom we are working will fall short and disappoint us and sometimes we will fall short and disappoint others. That's just the way it is. But I expect that we will be forgiving of each other and offer grace, just as we have received it. I expect we will remember who first loved us and offers the greatest gift of love.

Jesus sets the tone for his entire ministry in the Gospel of John in this lesson - he creates the expectation that he will work to do what is right and we, in turn, are inheritors of that expectation. Let us work together, to lovingly hold each other accountable, to offer grace and a helping hand when needed and to continue to spread the good news of the love and salvation found in Jesus Christ that is for all people. Amen.
