# Fifth Sunday in Lent

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#### **From Pastor Beth**

For God so loved the world that He gave His only Son, so that everyone that believes in Him may have eternal life. John 3:16

This beloved verse was in the gospel reading this past week. Many of us memorized it as children. What many of us don't remember is that it is part of the story of Nicodemus. Maybe you remember something of Nicodemus. He really wanted to meet Jesus, but Nicodemus was a Pharisee. So, under the cover of darkness, he arranged to meet Jesus. They had an interesting discussion about being born from above that includes the above verse. We are not told if Nicodemus understands after their discussion as the next section of the chapter switches to Jesus and the disciples.

This isn't the end of Nicodemus' story. We hear from him again in chapter 7. The Pharisees and chief priests had sent the temple police out to arrest Jesus. However, they come back without him. As they listened to Jesus teach and answer questions, they were amazed and refused to arrest him. The Pharisees were not happy, but Nicodemus makes a somewhat attempt to support Jesus. He questions why they have judged Jesus without a hearing.

One more time is Nicodemus mentioned in John. It is in chapter 19 after Jesus has died on the cross. Joseph of Arimathea takes Jesus' body down off the cross and Nicodemus shows up with spices to help. They wrap the body and place it in the tomb.

I write this because I picture Nicodemus as the typical evangelism story. We often question if we know enough to be able to tell people about Jesus. What happens if they ask a question I cannot answer? It makes us anxious. Well, you are not alone. Here we have Jesus telling Nicodemus about eternal life and it doesn't result in a dramatic life altering change. What does happen is a slow process of comprehension. Nicodemus gradually begins to understand and maybe he never fully understands. All we know is that at the end of Jesus' life, Nicodemus has enough respect and admiration for Jesus that he makes sure his body is properly cared for and buried.

This is how much of evangelism works. The seed is planted. Maybe we have the opportunity to see it sprout and grow, maybe we don't. Sometimes it is other people who see the fruit. Sometimes the seed needs to be replanted over and over again. The point is to keep planting. It's ok to not know the answer to every question. Just speak to your own experience - how faith in God has impacted your life. Then trust in the Holy Spirit to help that seed grow.

# Sermon by Pastor Beth 3/14/21

How many decisions do you make in a day? Think about all the conscious and unconscious things you decide to do. It is estimated that we make 34,000 decisions every day. Most of our decisions don't require a lot of thought, what to eat or when, smile or wave at someone across the room. We just do these things without thinking too much. We may put a bit more effort into bigger decisions such as stay with my present career or consider the fast-paced, rewarding world of ministry; stay

in New York or move some place with warmer weather year-round. But even the important decisions don't seem permanent. If we don't like our job, we will look for another. If we don't like where we live, we will move. Our decisions seem temporary. It's easy to forget that the choices we make have consequences.

Choice is built into our very existence. We cannot have it all. From the moment we are born, it is clear that there is more to see than we can see, more to do than we can ever do. We have more options than we can imagine.

Every time we choose a path, we miss countless others. Every decision is the death of all the other alternatives. It is difficult to admit that some directions are irreversible, that some decisions are permanent. It is painful to decide to do this when we know it means we will never be able to do that. It is easier to convince ourselves that all the paths end up converging, that it doesn't matter what anyone thinks or what they decide, that everything will turn out the same in the end. But that isn't true to our own life experience or our observations of others.

This story in the book of Numbers, this strange, scary, unsettling, unseemly, and slithering story is about decisions and their consequences. Moses is getting nothing but heartache from the Israelites. They are always whining. They have the gall to complain about being set free and describe captivity in Egypt as if it were the garden of Eden.

The people are dissatisfied. Their impatience turns to impertinence as they grumble about the wilderness, the lack of water and food, and the food that has been provided. I guess manna was like a bologna sandwich. It was never especially appealing and after years of the same thing, going hungry didn't seem so bad. At this point in the story what usually happened was that Moses would intercede with God, who would graciously meet the needs for food or water or security or whatever they wanted, but this time complaining about the menu prompts God to send poisonous serpents.

The snakes seem way, way, out of proportion to the crime to me. They were just grumbling about the food: manna yesterday, manna today, manna tomorrow. Who can really blame them? We all like a little variety.

According to Jewish teaching, the snakes are an ironic retribution. The rabbis explained that from creation, snakes have eaten only dust, and yet they have

done so without a word of complaint. Therefore, God has declared: "Let the serpent which does not complain about its food come and rule over these people complaining about theirs." The snake is an object lesson teaching humility and patience. The problem with this is that it's unlikely anyone would stop squirming long enough to figure it out. Snakes demand our full attention. We don't stop and ask, "What helpful lesson can I learn from this experience?" when there is a poisonous snake in the room!

The Israelites, not surprisingly, scream for help. They have a change of heart. They confess their wrongdoing and beg Moses to beg God to get rid of the snakes. God is eager to help, but their prayers aren't answered in exactly the way they had requested. The consequences of their actions don't disappear. The danger remains and the people continue to suffer from the death dealing snakes.

God doesn't remove the snakes, but rather commands Moses to make a bronze snake to put on a pole. Moses may have thought this was a strange request, but when you are up to your ankles in poisonous snakes, you don't ask questions. The promise is that everyone who chooses to take a look will be fine. You will still get a snake bite, but you will live. It works like a charm. The snake on the pole, this distasteful sight lifted up, when people look at it, healing happens. The point is that when the people look to God, they find healing.

Even if you get rid of all the bizarre stuff - the manna, the poisonous serpents, and the snake on a stick - this story still sounds peculiar to us, because the difference between life and death is one decision.

The writer of the Gospel of John remembers this story and says that it is almost like that bronze snake when Christ is lifted up so that all can see the passionate love of God. The cross itself is strange, scary, unsettling, unseemly. The sight of the cross is so distasteful that it's easy to miss the point. Christ's death reveals the extent of God's mercy for all of us who are snake-bit by the power of death. It's not the cross that heals so much as it is the love behind the cross. These two strange stories, the snake and the cross, are both about God's grace.

For Christians, Jesus is the defining revelation of God's love. That doesn't mean that Christians believe that no one else knows God, but it does mean that in Jesus we best see God's mercy. This verse we have known from childhood,

John 3:16, the one Martin Luther called the gospel in miniature, promises that God loves the whole world, not just those who gather on Sunday, not just the religiously inclined, not just those who have heard the name of Jesus, but the whole world. God comes in Christ to show the way of life in the midst of death, the way of peace in a violent world.

God has given us the wonderful, painful gift of choice. From the first choice we make in the morning until we choose to go to sleep at night, we are making the decisions that form our lives. We choose in the words we speak, the words we don't speak, the people we love, the people we don't even see, the thought we entertain, the ideas we hold, the deeds we do, and the deeds we leave undone. We choose to build up or tear down, to love or ignore, to heal or hurt, to bless or curse. We choose death or life. Christ chose death so that we could choose life. Look to Christ and see the possibilities. Look to the cross, see life abundant.
