Third Sunday of Easter

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From Pastor Beth-

And Jesus came and said to them, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age." Matthew 28:18-20

We often refer to these verses as the Great Commission. Jesus spoke these words to the disciples after he had been resurrected. The disciples went to Galilee and Jesus met them there. These verses speak to the mission of the Church since the beginning.

Yet many of us feel inadequate to fulfill this commission. I often hear faithful people say that they don't know the bible well enough to be able to answer questions. I confess that I often feel that way as well. As often as I have read through the bible, I still feel that way. Let's face the fact that not all of us have memories that can retain every detail. People who can are rare, impressive, but rare.

So how do we get past this if we are to fulfill the commission Jesus has given us? It always helps me to personalize the story. For example: Take the verses we started with, Matthew 28:18-20. How can I envision myself in this commission? What would my life look like if I took this commission seriously? How would it be different?

I don't think that the average unchurched person expects us all to be bible scholars. They want to know how your faith has impacted your life. If we Christians cannot tell them that, then they are not going to invest time and energy into a church. This really is about bringing the bible stories alive in our communities.

Pastor Sam has worked with the parish Outreach Committee to develop a training program to help us speak about our experience with bible stories. We will be using this training program to look at several bible stories and discover their relevance for our lives today. This will take place during the bible study groups on Monday and Tuesday. A Prayer of Teilhard de Chardin

Above all, trust in the slow work of God.

We are quite naturally impatient in everything to reach the end without delay.

We should like to skip the intermediate stages.

We are impatient of being on the way to something unknown, something new.

And yet it is the law of all progress that it is made by passing through some stages of instability— and that it may take a very long time.

And so I think it is with you;
your ideas mature gradually—let them grow,
let them shape themselves, without undue haste.
Don't try to force them on,
as though you could be today what time
(that is to say, grace and circumstances acting on your own good will)
will make of you tomorrow.

Only God could say what this new spirit gradually forming within you will be.

Give Our Lord the benefit of believing that his hand is leading you, and accept the anxiety of feeling yourself in suspense and incomplete.

A Reflection on Easter: "The Glad Surprise" by Howard Thurman

There is ever something compelling and exhilarating about the glad surprise. The emphasis is upon *glad*. There are surprises that are shocking, startling, frightening, and bewildering. But the glad surprise is something

different from all of these. It carries with it the element of elation, of life, of something over and beyond the surprise itself.

The experience itself comes at many levels: the simple joy that comes when one discovers that the balance in the bank is larger than the personal record indicated – and there is no error in accounting; the realization that one does not have his doorkey – the hour is late and everyone is asleep – but someone very thoughtfully left the latch off, "just in case"; the dreaded meeting in a conference to work out some problems of misunderstanding, and things are adjusted without the emotional lacerations anticipated; the report from the doctor's examination that all is well, when one was sure that the physical picture was very serious indeed. All of these surprises are glad!

There is a deeper meaning in the concept of the glad surprise. This meaning has to do with the very ground and foundation of hope about the nature of life itself. The manifestation of this quality in the world about us can best be witnessed in the coming of spring. It is ever a new thing, a glad surprise, the stirring of Life at the end of winter. One day there seems to be no sign of life and then almost overnight, swelling buds, delicate blooms, blades of grass, bugs, insects – an entire world of newness everywhere. It is the glad surprise at the end of winter.

Often the same experience comes at the end of a long tunnel of tragedy and tribulation. It is as if a man stumbling in the darkness, having lost his way, finds that the spot at which he falls is the foot of a stairway that leads from darkness into light. Such is the glad surprise.

This is what Easter means in the experience of the race. This is the resurrection! It is the announcement that life cannot ultimately be conquered by death, that there is no road that is at last swallowed up in an ultimate darkness, that there is strength added when the labors increase, that multiplied

peace matches multiplied trials, that life is bottomed by the glad surprise. Take courage, therefore:

When we have exhausted our store of endurance,
When our strength has failed ere the day is half done,
When we reach the end of our hoarded resources,
Our Father's full giving is only begun.

Isaiah 25:1-6, NLT

In that day, everyone in the land of Judah will sing this song:

Our city is strong!

We are surrounded by the walls of God's salvation.

Open the gates to all who are righteous;

allow the faithful to enter.

You will keep in perfect peace

all who trust in you,

all whose thoughts are fixed on you!

Trust in the Lord always,

for the Lord God is the eternal Rock.

He humbles the proud

and brings down the arrogant city.

He brings it down to the dust.

The poor and oppressed trample it underfoot, and the needy walk all over it.

Sermon by Pastor Beth 4/11/21

I've always liked the story of Thomas, the skeptical disciple, who did not at first believe that Jesus was back from the dead. I wonder how many of us feel like him...at least every now and then. I suspect there is a bit of Thomas in all of us.

It's Easter evening, after dark. The disciples are gathered behind locked doors because they are afraid. We tend to lock doors to prevent something from scaring us or to keep others away from us. I am in the habit of locking my doors every time I leave and enter. I don't like surprises like someone walking into home. Locked doors give us a sense of safety.

Jesus appears before the disciples this night in spite of being behind a locked door. He says, "Peace be with you" and then does a rather odd thing. He shares the peace and then "He showed them his hands and his side." Look closely at the story and you will notice there is not even a breath separating these comforting words of Jesus and then parading his scars. There is something important going on here that connects the peace of Christ with the wounds of Christ. Jesus stands among them, shows off his palms, hikes up his shirt and lets them take a gander at where the spear went in. "Peace be with you," and then his wounds are immediately on display.

We have been sharing the peace in the Lutheran liturgy since at least 1978 when the Lutheran Book of Worship made its debut. Of course, the practice actually goes back to biblical times, but perhaps nothing has generated more controversy and resistance in liturgical reform among Lutherans than this ancient and very scriptural practice in our worship order.

What would happen if we took our cues from Jesus in sharing the peace? Imagine what that would sound like. "Peace be with you and take a look at my surgery incision." "Peace be with you and let me show you the bills I had a hard

time paying last week." "Peace be with you and let me tell you about my son who is struggling with drugs and alcohol." Peace be with you and I'm so lonely in this pandemic world. Would the sharing of the peace become more important than just saying hello to someone? Could we, who are so private, open our arms to show our wounds to others so that they could see Jesus working in us?

A week later the disciples are all together again - same house, same shut doors. I think it is significant that Thomas is allowed to remain with the community in spite of his unbelief. There doesn't seem to be a hint of pressure to believe. He stayed with the community, roamed the fields and asked questions that whole week. I suspect nobody would have minded if he had done that for a month, a year or even longer.

But it is a week later. Jesus again says those same words: "Peace be with you." He offers his hands, hikes up his shirt. Jesus wants Thomas to touch his wounds, if necessary, for Thomas to believe.

Thomas came to belief because the wounds were on display in that first community of believers. Jesus' wounds were shown to them, but also the wounds of the disciples. Their wounds of guilt, betrayal, and dishonesty were evident in every face. Our wounds are part of who we are and it is important to acknowledge the role they play in making us who we are.

In 1958 Lili Jacob was the winning contestant on the show Queen for a Day. When asked what they wanted if selected as queen, most contestants asked for a washer and dryer or a vacation.

Not Lili Jacob. She asked for 500 dollars to have a plastic surgeon remove the number A-10862 from her arm. It had been tattooed there at Auschwitz. She was the winner that day.

But even though Lili Jacob had that tattoo number removed, she would not, could not ever forget that it was there. She would bear the scar, not just on her

arm, but in her heart. We are a wounded people. Sometimes we pretend that nothing is wrong, even to our friends. It is often considered bad form to confess our weaknesses, so we say, "fine, everything is fine," lying through our teeth. But on this first Easter evening, Jesus refuses to pretend. He refuses to pretend that nothing has happened.

Words alone fail to convince Thomas. Thomas was called the twin. Perhaps there is a side of us that is sibling to Thomas. We need an authentic look at our Lord's wounds.

True peace - and perhaps true belief - are possible only when we deal seriously with the wounds of the body of Christ, the church. How shall we move beyond the locked doors where we hide so adeptly in fear? We acknowledge the hurt, the wounds, the pain. We allow ourselves to be vulnerable. We see the scars and we begin the process of healing.

Peace be with you he said. Then he showed them his hands and his side.

Sermon

L: Let us proclaim our faith using the words of the Nicene Creed.

Nicene Creed

C: We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the virgin Mary and became truly human. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshiped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.
