Fifth Sunday of Easter

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From Pastor Beth

Cain said to his brother Abel, "Let us go out to the field." And when they were in the field, Cain rose up against his brother Abel, and killed him. Then the Lord said to Cain. "Where is your brother Abel?" He said, "I do not know; am I my brother's keeper?"

These verses from Genesis 4 were part of our Bible study this past week. Cain used these words to distance himself from what he had done referring to keeping track of the location of his brother. Of course, Cain was lying as he knew where Abel's body lay. What does it mean to you to be your brother's keeper?

Let's start with what it doesn't mean. To be your brother's keeper does not mean that we keep track of another's movements, take care of their every need, fix their problems, or force them to do what we want them to do even if it would be good for them. When we do these things, it is really about our own needs and emotions or even a symptom of our lack of control in life. But forcing ourselves on others to fulfill our own needs only leads to resentment, anger, and hurt.

To be a brother's keeper is not about us. Take a look at Martin Luther's explanation of the 5th and 7th commandments. The 5th commandment states that you shall not murder. Luther writes "We should fear and love God so that we do not hurt or harm our neighbor in his body but help and support him in every physical need." The 7th commandment states that you shall not steal. Luther writes "We should fear and love God so that we do not take our neighbor's money or possessions, or get them in any dishonest way, but help him to improve and protect his possessions and income." Both of these commandments are about caring about our brothers and sisters, not controlling them.

Luther would have us examine our motives in all our interactions with others. Help a neighbor with yard work because you see they could use the help, not because you think they are doing it wrong or you don't like what they are doing! Take a meal to someone because you know they could use the company. Hold a door or elevator because you notice

someone with their arms full or in a hurry. Invite someone to church because you hope they will find a meaningful encounter with God, not because your congregation could use another person in the pew.

Luther points us to the needs of others and away from ourselves and our own motives. When we serve others for their sake, not our own, we are truly serving God.

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Samuel Anoints David, 1 Samuel 16:1-13, CEB

The Lord said to Samuel, "How long are you going to grieve over Saul? I have rejected him as king over Israel. Fill your horn with oil and get going. I'm sending you to Jesse of Bethlehem because I have found my next king among his sons."

"How can I do that?" Samuel asked. "When Saul hears of it he'll kill me!"

"Take a heifer with you," the Lord replied, "and say, 'I have come to make a sacrifice to the Lord.' Invite Jesse to the sacrifice, and I will make clear to you what you should do. You will anoint for me the person I point out to you."

Samuel did what the Lord instructed. When he came to Bethlehem, the city elders came to meet him. They were shaking with fear. "Do you come in peace?" they asked.

"Yes," Samuel answered. "I've come to make a sacrifice to the Lord. Now make yourselves holy, then come with me to the sacrifice." Samuel made Jesse and his sons holy and invited them to the sacrifice as well.

When they arrived, Samuel looked at Eliab and thought, that must be the Lord's anointed right in front.

But the Lord said to Samuel, "Have no regard for his appearance or stature, because I haven't selected him. God doesn't look at things like humans do. Humans see only what is visible to the eyes, but the Lord sees into the heart."

Next Jesse called for Abinadab, who presented himself to Samuel, but he said, "The Lord hasn't chosen this one either." So Jesse presented Shammah, but Samuel said, "No, the Lord hasn't chosen this one." Jesse presented seven of his sons to Samuel, but Samuel said to Jesse, "The Lord hasn't picked any of these." Then Samuel asked Jesse, "Is that all of your boys?"

"There is still the youngest one," Jesse answered, "but he's out keeping the sheep."

"Send for him," Samuel told Jesse, "because we can't proceed until he gets here."

So Jesse sent and brought him in. He was reddish brown, had beautiful eyes, and was good-looking. The Lord said, "That's the one. Go anoint him." So Samuel took the horn of oil and anointed him right there in front of his brothers. The Lord's spirit came over David from that point forward.

Easter 4 Sermon - Good Shepherd Sunday by Pastor Sam Perret (based on Psalm 23, John 10:11-18)

When you think about or hear the words of Psalm 23, what comes to mind? I think we often associate this psalm with funerals - as these comforting words have been used in funeral services for as long as we can remember. Does anyone think of anything else when they hear these words?

Because I came to the faith a little later than many, I remember exactly where I was when I first heard these words. It was an early evening on a summer day in the Helderberg Mountains. I was maybe 9 years old or so and spent much of my time next door at Grandma's house. I had just positioned my grandmother's lawn ornaments back into place after my mother mowed her front yard. I was enjoying a popsicle and sitting on the freshly cut grass under the maple tree. My grandmother sat in her lawn chair next to me. The air smelled of grass and the flowers in the nearby flower bed.

As I sat with my popsicle, Grandma started reciting the words to Psalm 23. I asked her what that was and she told me it was from the Bible, that Jesus was the shepherd, who protected and comforted us, who brought us peace. She told me that God was responsible for the beautiful creation around us and on evenings like that, she was reminded of the words to that Psalm. I asked her to repeat it and she did. Over and over she recited and I repeated after her until I had it memorized as well.

Now, even all these years later, when I hear those words, I hear them in my grandmother's voice. She only had an 8th grade education, but she knew her scriptures well and knew just how to introduce me to the Jesus she loved with her whole heart. She didn't tell me *about* Jesus, rather she gave me the opportunity to *meet* Jesus myself. She didn't give me dates, timelines or even a history of miracles that Jesus performed. Instead she

shared stories with me - about how the lessons from the Bible shaped her, the miracles she had encountered in her own life, and when she felt the comforting arms of Jesus around her during times of struggle and hardship. I witnessed the way her life was changed by her relationship with Jesus. And I wanted that for myself.

In the Gospel lesson today, we hear Jesus referring to himself as the Good Shepherd - hearkening back to the words of David's psalm. Those listening to Jesus would have known the psalmist's words - and seen how Jesus was creating a connection between the words of old to his existence in front of them. Jesus would be the One to offer comfort. Jesus would be the one to guide his flock. Jesus would be the one to protect. Jesus would be the one to give sacrificially and abundantly. Jesus would abide in us and we in him.

Jesus knows his own, and his own know him. Jesus doesn't just know about us, like we are a mere acquaintance - he knows us. We are welcomed into a relationship with Jesus so that we don't just know about him, but truly know him and listen to his voice. This is the one time that we WANT to be sheep! And Jesus has other sheep that are not of this fold - though they are also his.

Now this lesson talks about a fold of sheep and flocks of sheep, so I'm going to clarify the difference. The fold was an enclosure, a fenced-in area, a safe space for the sheep of various flocks to be kept at a given time. If we were talking about horses, we might use the term "paddock." If we are talking about people, we might use the term sanctuary or church building.

Because Jesus knows all of us in this fold and we all know him, we hear his voice - maybe not literally, but it may be that gentle nudging we get when the Spirit wants us to act, or a feeling we get when we need to seek forgiveness or repair relationships. We are his own. He knows us - just like he knows other sheep of his flock - though some of them might not know him yet. And the beauty is that Jesus is collecting us all together - to be one. One flock with one shepherd is what Jesus says.

Though we are but sheep, we can help our shepherd. We can help other sheep to hear the voice of Jesus - to recognize and KNOW the voice of Jesus. We do this by sharing Jesus with others. By sharing what Jesus means to us, what Jesus has done for us, and how much better our lives are because we know and love and trust Jesus. We do not only talk about Jesus here in this building, in this fold. We mingle with sheep from other flocks. We demonstrate how we are affected by

Jesus, and the sheep of other flocks will see it. They may further bless us by becoming a part of this fold, if they seek that kind of relationship with Jesus. But first they have to meet him.

My grandmother had brought her children to church every Sunday to meet Jesus - but as they grew, they resisted - they didn't like being forced or guilted to go to church so they stopped going and didn't really bring their own children. As my generation grew (there are 20 of us), we just didn't know Jesus well at all.

So instead of my grandmother bringing me to a church building to hear about Jesus, she brought Jesus to me, in the grassy lawn on a summer evening, through her stories of her relationship with him. She made me curious. Her stories were an encouragement for me to go to the fold to hear from others, to worship together the God who is so powerful in our lives. In our parish evangelism team, we are just learning these lessons now, how our stories are intermingled with God's story and how powerful the art of storytelling is when it comes to spreading the Gospel.

"I am the good shepherd" - the one who has sacrificed his life for his flock out of abundant love and has triumphed over death to reign with God. This is good news - if we tell it and tell it right so that others *feel* how we are impacted by this news, we may help other sheep to know the Good Shepherd. One flock, one shepherd, one love, one God.
